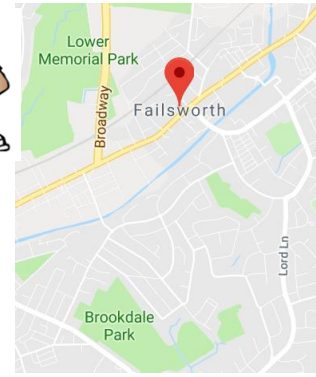


# Year 2 -Where in the World? Failsworth

## Subject Specific Vocabulary

<b>street</b>	A public road in a city, town, or village, typically with houses and buildings on one or both sides.
<b>address</b>	Locates exactly where someone lives by having street and town names.
<b>physical features</b>	A natural feature of the environment such as a cliff or hill.
<b>human Features</b>	A man-made feature of the environment created by humans such as roads and shops.
<b>city</b>	A place where thousands of people live and work with many houses, offices, roads and modes of transport.
<b>town</b>	Smaller than a city but still a place with lots of homes and where many people work.
<b>village</b>	A village is usually associated with the countryside and is smaller than a town.
<b>office</b>	A building where people work usually using computers and telephones.
<b>landmark</b>	A important sight in a city, town or village.
<b>map symbol</b>	A small picture on a map which tells you where something is (e.g. churches, post offices and hospitals).



## Key Facts

- The Failsworth Pole was built in 1793. It was originally made of wood and used as a maypole.
- In the past Oldham was famous for cotton mills and lots of local people worked there.
- In the past people bought their food from small local shops like butchers and bakeries, instead of larger supermarkets like Tesco.
- There used to be a trainline which ran from Oldham to Manchester. Nowadays, people travel by tram.
- Benjamin Brierley was a famous poet from Failsworth. There is a statue of him in the town.
